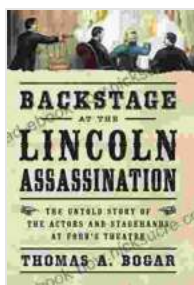


Backstage at the Lincoln Assassination: An Unforgettable Night

The Moment of Impact

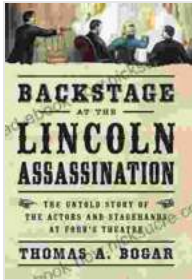

Engraving depicting the assassination of Abraham Lincoln at Ford's Theatre, April 14, 1865. (Source: Library of Congress)

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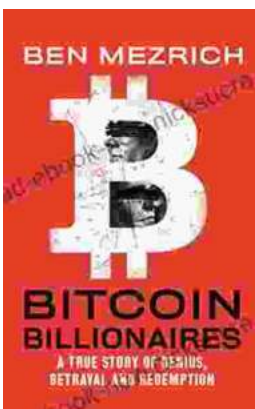


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
