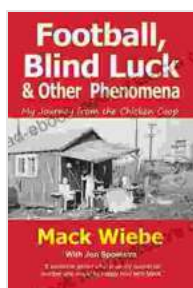


Football Blind Luck and Other Unusual Phenomena

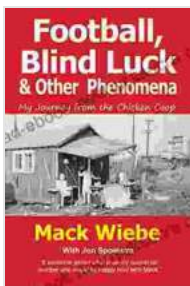


The Suarez Bite

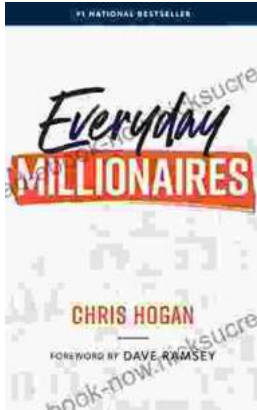

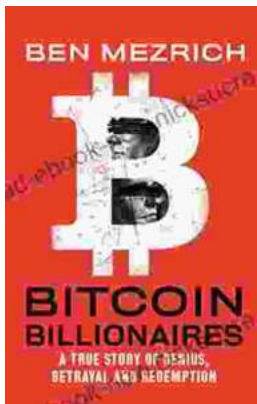
