
Little Gloria: The Extraordinary Life of Gloria Vanderbilt



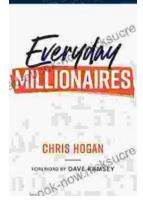
