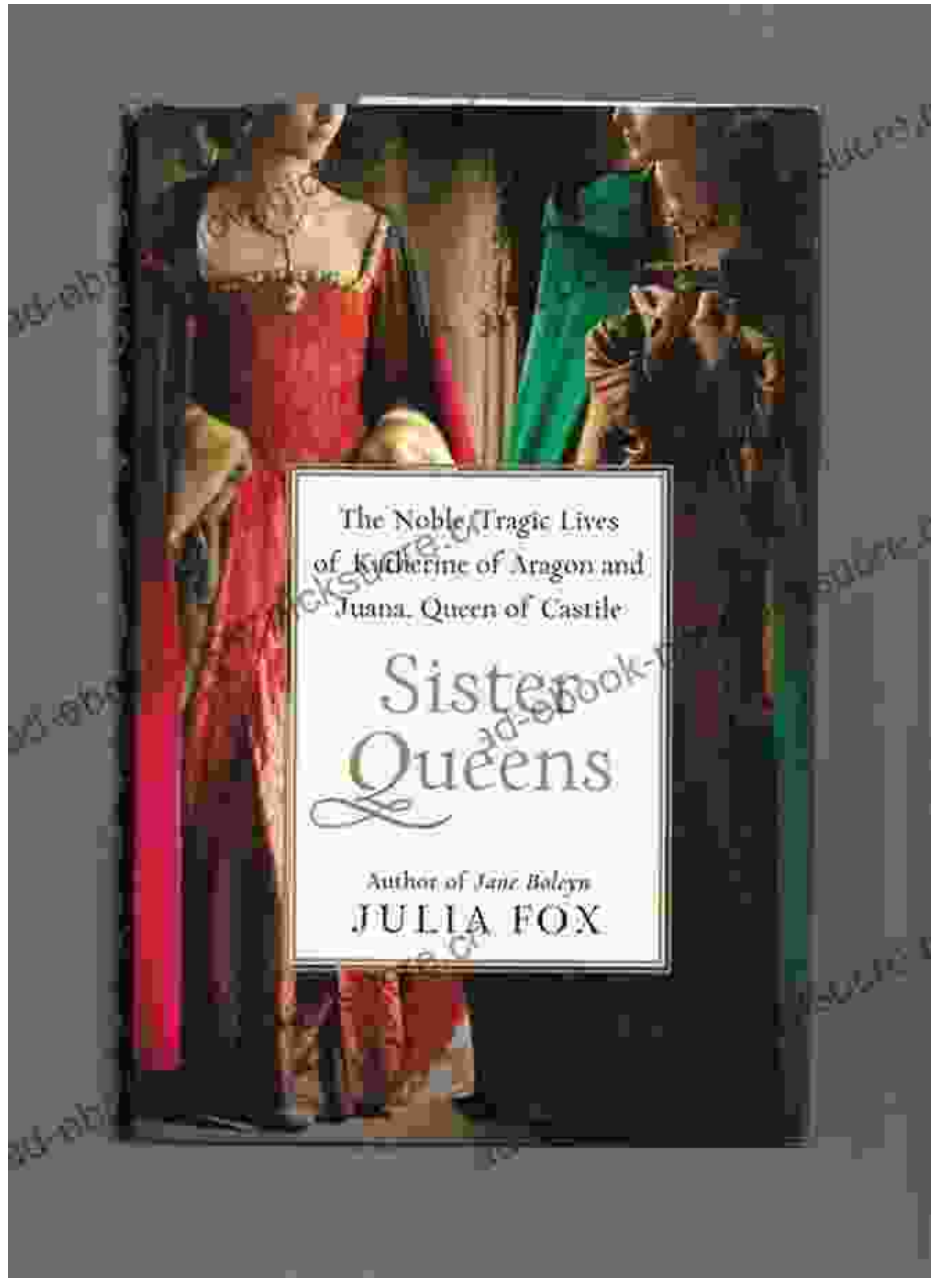
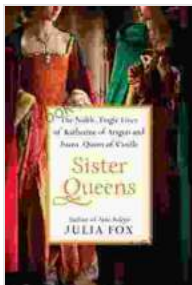


The Noble Tragic Lives of Katherine of Aragon and Juana Queen of Castile

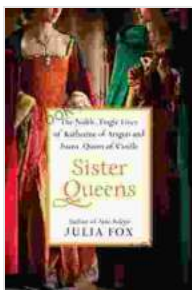
