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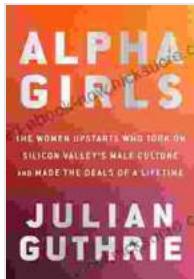

Bumble has quickly become one of the most popular dating apps in the world. The app has over 100 million users and has been downloaded over 500 million times.

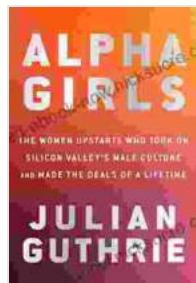
Sophia Amoruso: Nasty Gal

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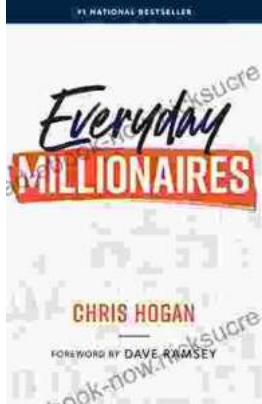
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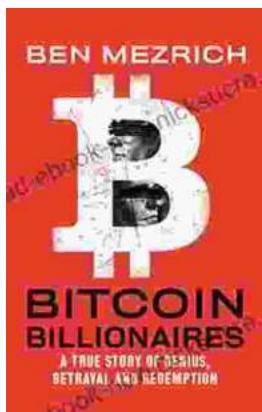
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
