

- Intersectoral Collaboration: Coordinating efforts between health, transportation, and social welfare sectors will address the underlying determinants of health inequities.

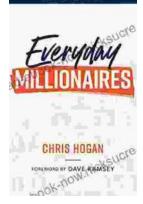
