
Two Presidents, Three Mistakes, and One Great Weekend: Touchpoints to a Better World

issues. We need to be more willing to find common ground with each other, even if we disagree on other issues.


- Forgive each other. Carter and Bush were able to forgive each other for the mistakes they had made. We need to be more willing to forgive each other, even if we have been deeply wronged.

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
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
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
